

## Aboriginal Peoples Oral Sources

in

### *Guide to Oral History Collections in Canada/ Guide des fonds d'histoire orale au Canada(1)*

In 1982 an attempt was made by the Sound Archives Division (2) of the then National Archives of Canada (now Library and Archives Canada) to publish a national inventory of oral history collections in Canada - similar to publications in the United States and Great Britain. Karen Haines carried out a lot of the initial work but eventually funding problems interrupted the achievement of a published directory. However, this first attempt revealed the existence of a lot of oral history in Canadian heritage institutions such as museums, libraries and archives. It was not until the 1990s "when demands from the research community joined those of the collecting community" (3) that the Canadian Oral History Association (COHA) was encouraged to take the project on itself.

COHA applied for and received a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council grant and was fortunate to hire Normand Fortier for this one-year project to compile the first ever national inventory of oral history collections in Canada. He was provided office space by the Visual and Sound Archives Division as well as on-going administrative assistance from Joan Fairweather, Carolyn Vachon and Wilma MacDonald, and reported regularly to Professor James Morrison of St. Mary's University, Halifax and Richard Lohead, Visual and Sound Archives Division, the supervisors of the project. As Project Co-ordinator, Normand, with the help of COHA executive members and regional representatives, devised a comprehensive questionnaire form.

Over a thousand institutions were surveyed and 354 of them responded positively, and their collections were uniformly described for inclusion in the *Guide to Oral History Collections in Canada/Guide des fonds d'histoire orale au Canada*. The collections represented a wide variety of disciplines, themes, cultural groups and geographic regions of Canada. Financial assistance was also received from the Ontario Heritage Foundation, Ontario Ministry of Culture and Communications for this publication project.

Countless volunteer hours of telephone follow-ups by Ursula Faulkner and editorial and proofreading tasks carried out by a dedicated COHA executive culminated in the finalization of the *Guide* and its publication in December 1993. The day the publication was received back from the printers, in its spiffy blue and white cover and black coil binding, all 402 pages of it, was one of celebration. We savoured this milestone in COHA's history by getting together at my home for champagne toasts to Normand and company.

About three years after the publication of the *Guide* I was a member of an Association of Canadian Archivists' ad-hoc committee whose aim was to lay the groundwork for the establishment of a Special Interest Section on Aboriginal Archives (SISAA). At a subsequent ACA-SISAA meeting I took the opportunity of mentioning the wealth of oral history collections pertaining to Canada's many Aboriginal groups to be found in the *Guide*. Using Normand Fortier's Subject Index to English-Language Entries and Index des sujets pour les descriptions en Français, myself and Gilles L. Durocher prepared a list of Aboriginal Oral Sources from the former and the latter respectively. This was intended to both advertise the work which had been carried out by COHA and to investigate the extent of Aboriginal Peoples' oral traditions and/or oral history collections preserved in Canadian repositories, ca. 1992. Our combined list was completed in time for the ACA annual conference held in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia in 1997, at which "SISAA" formally came into existence.

This important information is published here for the first time in order to share with the readers of *Oral History FORUM d'histoire orale*

our findings on the topic of Aboriginal oral traditions and/or oral history interview materials – or at least to point them in that direction – through the use of the following "key" to such materials found in COHA's *Guide*. The English language Appendix is an alphabetical listing from "Abenakis" to "Wahpaton Dakota", while the French language Appendix is an alphabetical listing from "Algonquins" to "Montagnais". Both Appendices are merely "bare bones" kinds of research tools. They can only make sense when accompanied by a copy of the COHA *Guide* to shed light on the scope and content of each entry. The numbers refer to the *Guide* entries, not pages. Readers who do not already have their own copy of the *Guide* will need to borrow one from their local library, or they will need to enquire about purchasing a copy from the Canadian Oral History Association/Société canadienne d'histoire orale.(4)

We hope that the Appendices will serve as another layer of "finding aid" to be used in uncovering Aboriginal oral history collections preserved in a variety of institutions across the country. Oral history sources have been generally "under-used" by researchers and, I believe, the creation of directories and guides are essential to spreading the word about the incredible wealth of non-textual information that is available out there. Each "repository" entry in the publication itself is accompanied by its mailing address, telephone number, hours of operation, copying information and availability of on site playback equipment for the benefit of potential users. Note that I have not provided all of these categories of information in the extracted entries below.

To give you an idea of the "fuller" descriptions in COHA's 1993 publication, here are some examples of the types of descriptions for Aboriginal oral sources found in the *Guide*. I have chosen just a few to give you an idea of the scope of the material in the larger *Guide*:

Interviews are augmented by contextual material from experts and personalities who situate the bands in the contemporary Native struggle. Topics include hunting, trapping, beliefs, food, clothing, health and traditional medicine, language, wildlife conservation, ethnic relations, the judicial system, missionary work, logging, and tourism. Some material concerns Algonquin and Ojibwa. Most tapes of broadcast quality, some of phone quality, 3 interviews of amateur quality.

Over twelve years have gone by since Normand Fortier compiled the entries for the *Guide*. There is every likelihood that researchers today may find additional finding aids, more transcriptions, and potentially larger oral history tape collections related to Canada's Aboriginal Peoples in the participating institutions. And, if such is the case, it would suggest that volume two of the *Guide* would be a very worthwhile project to undertake. Or, if such is not the case, we need to urge the repositories to create better descriptions of Aboriginal Peoples' sound heritage hidden among their holdings. A Volume 2 would potentially uncover additional institutions and their collections.

Time, and lots of it, is required to do research into oral sources, but where and when such research is undertaken, the rewards are immeasurable. We are indebted to all those people who had the foresight to collect and/or who gave their stories so that Aboriginal Peoples' languages and cultures could be preserved in many repositories across the country for future generations. The COHA *Guide to Oral History Collections in Canada/Guide des fonds d'histoire orale au Canada* has captured a portion of what is out there and Normand Fortier, James H. Morrison, Richard Lohead, Joan Fairweather and all those involved in this early 1990s project have set a high standard for others to follow.

Here, then, are the two Indexes....and I hope you have your copy of the *Guide* (COHA Journal Vol. 13, 1993) handy.
